Revelation

Overview

The Bible is not straightforward or simple; misunderstanding the nature of revelation many have made the Bible say what they like. The good news is, with the Spirit of wisdom and revelation (Ephesians 1:17) it becomes the AIR we breathe! This session helps a small group leader facilitate a discussion about the nature of revelation, exploring the importance of context and progression (building layer on layer).

Objectives

The aims of this session are to

- Understand that revelation is spoken into a specific context.
- Realise the progressive nature of revelation and how that affects the way we read the OT.
- Appreciate how the Bible helps our own journey into greater revelation.

Question Led Discussion

Why did God take around 2000 years (Abraham to Jesus) to reveal Himself fully?

- Our ability to receive revelation is limited. We need to understand one precept before hearing another. Is 28:9-10
- God compares His people to a child He is bringing up to maturity. We explain things about the world very differently to 5 year olds than 15 year olds.
- God is prepared to go at our pace, He's patient.

Why did God choose to communicate to their context, their circumstances, rather than just go straight to eternal truth?

- We may not realise the significance of eternal truth if we can't apply it. It would likely not have been passed down!
- We're not devaluing the OT scriptures by saying this. We're just recognizing that their power is only really appreciated in context.

Would the cross have made sense in Eden or Egypt?

- Adam & Eve knew so little, a man dying for them would have been incomprehensible! They needed to learn their choices had consequences.
- Describing God as love, as humble, as being prepared to die, would probably have come across very weak in the ancient world. The Israelites needed a powerful God to rescue them from Egypt.
- No! God's people needed to learn that God wasn't interested in their sacrifices. Rather, He wants a humble heart (Psalm 51:16-17, Micah 6:8) and that He would be our sacrifice to free us from the controlling fear of death (Heb 2:14-15).
- We need an appreciation of our weakness to appreciate God's sacrifice for us.
